

<p>UPDATE FROM CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER</p> <p>John Baackes</p>	<p><u>PUBLIC COMMENT</u></p> <p>Submitted by Elizabeth Cooper RCAC 2 Member: <i>What is the status of the L.A. Care budget and will it affect L.A. Care members? Is there going to be a reduction in services, etc. Will you update the members with the new president and the stimulus check that the congress is considering for the people of the United States? How will it impact L.A. Care members?</i></p> <p>John Baackes, <i>Chief Executive Officer</i>, gave the following updates:</p> <p>He responded to Ms. Cooper's comment that L.A. Care has received rates for 2021 and will be revising its budget as a result. The rates are higher than was estimated when budget was adopted in September 2020. There will be no reduction in services to members and no</p>	

services will be cut. Last year rates were cut by 1.5% and L.A. Care maintained its contracts with providers.

Mr. Baackes stated there has been a surge in COVID 19 cases in Los Angeles County. He noted that up until November, many people did not know someone who was personally affected by the virus, but since the recent surge, for many people that has changed. More people have been affected in terms of the recession and job losses. L.A. Care has lost two employees to COVID-19, and has made the difficult decision to close the Community Resource Centers (CRC) due to the surge over the last month. Due to the pandemic, L.A. Care did not want people to leave their homes if they did not have to. L.A. Care is looking at resuming CRC activities in the future.

COVID 19 Vaccination

One valuable thing that L.A. Care can do is be truthful about the vaccine distribution. New directives are provided daily by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH). DPH has released a plan for vaccine distribution that establishes phases when people are eligible for a vaccine. The vaccine distribution will become more clear as the county moves into Phase 1b and then into Phase 1c. The general public will be able to get vaccinated in the last phase. L.A. Care is functioning well and is meeting all the needs of the members, providers and the communities it serves.

Lluvia Salazar, *At-Large Member*, stated that since L.A. Care stands for truth, where are RCAC members on the list to get vaccinated? Mr. Baackes responded that being an ECAC member does not qualify one for vaccination according to the DPH plan. Richard Seidman, MD, MPH, *Chief Medical Officer*, responded that there are priorities, for example, In-Home Support Services members are prioritized because they are caregivers to older and disabled individuals. Mr. Baackes stated that L.A. Care will reach out to notify members about the vaccine eligibility.

Estela Lara, *RCAC 2 Chair*, stated that many people need the food distribution services for members. She asked if these services will resume. Mr. Baackes responded that logistics are being worked out to continue food drives. Ms. Lara stated that she suggests holding these events twice a month. She noted that it is best to do it more frequently, because the food runs out quickly. Mr. Baackes responded that L.A. Care will continue to hold food drives once logistics are worked out and they can be conducted safely.

Andria McFerson, *RCAC 6 Member*, asked when the Family Resource Centers (FRCs) will open again. Mr. Baackes stated that they were opened last September, but have recently been closed due to the pandemic, and will be closed at least through February. At the end of February, FRCs may reopen if it is safe to do so. Ms. McFerson asked how will disabled people receive or participate during the food drives. The people and the families who have

	<p>the virus also need assistance. Mr. Baackes responded that the agencies that L.A. Care works with are looking at ways to reach those populations. He noted that 150 members are being supported through Project Angel Food, through a grant that was given last year. Those agencies rely on volunteers, but they have hired restaurant workers who lost their jobs due to the pandemic to work in their kitchens. Now they have had five positive COVID-19 cases and they placed people on leave. Too many incidents like these will shut down the organization. He stated that L.A. Care will continue to support Project Angel Food and other agencies like it.</p> <p>Tanya Byrd, <i>RCAC 9 Chair</i>, shared stimulus check information with the committee. She stated that people can visit www.irs.gov and put basic information and find out when they will receive their stimulus check. Mr. Baackes thanked her for sharing this information.</p> <p>Hilda Perez, <i>Member Representative, Board of Governors</i>, stated that in Los Angeles someone is infected every 6 seconds; things are really bad in Los Angeles County. She noted that essential workers are being advised by health officials to wear masks in their own homes. She has been updating her information for the South Los Angeles area, specifically at Martin Luther King Jr. Hospital. She noted that Cedar-Sinai, a hospital that is known to treat celebrities, is currently at 20% ICU capacity and Martin Luther King Jr. Hospital is at 97% capacity. It's really bad in that area. People continue to go to the hospital really sick and it's the most affected region in Los Angeles County. She asked Mr. Baackes to help those that need help getting services. She knows that he is on many different boards and can speak to health officials. There are many people in need. She thanked L.A. Care for its efforts with food drives. There is a great need for food distribution. The fact that the food runs out quickly shows the need for these services. Her community is most at risk and people are really concerned about these issues. People in her area are afraid to go out of their homes. She noted that many essential workers are Latinos; the people that stock food shelves, work at grocery stores, or work in the fields harvesting foods are most at risk, because they are exposed more due to their jobs. In these communities everyone knows someone close to them has been infected or passed away due to COVID -19. She encouraged anyone who is an essential worker or is family of an essential worker to please wear their masks. Mr. Baackes responded that L.A. Care is well aware of the repercussions she enumerated. He knows that L.A. Care members are the most vulnerable due to many of the reasons she just mentioned. L.A. Care will continue to address all these concerns. He stated that Dr. Seidman will provide more information about this during his report.</p>	
<p>UPDATE FROM CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER</p> <p>Richard Seidman, <i>MD, MPH</i></p>	<p><u>PUBLIC COMMENT</u></p> <p>Submitted by Elizabeth Cooper, <i>RCAC 2 Member</i>. <i>Where can L.A. Care members get the COVID-19 vaccines. I would like to know the locations of where members could go to receive it and if members will need to pay for it.</i></p>	

Dr. Seidman responded that Phase 1a of the pandemic vaccine plan is in effect. It's not time yet for all L.A. Care members to get vaccinated. L.A. Care's website will be updated with this information once it is available. Members will be able to get the vaccine at their local doctor's office, their pharmacy, or community-wide vaccine sites. He noted that Dodgers stadium and Disneyland are being converted into mass vaccination sites.

Dr. Seidman gave the following COVID-19 updates:

Los Angeles County is in the midst of a very difficult time and is bracing for the full impact of the New Year's Eve holiday gatherings. Typically, people who are infected will start seeing symptoms in day 14. They may not need to be hospitalized for two weeks. He expects the surge to continue until mid-February. By that point, the number of people vaccinated will hopefully see some relief from the current surge. What is happening in Los Angeles is happening in many parts of the world. Last week there were 5 million new cases worldwide. The three-day average number of COVID patients hospitalized in Los Angeles is now 10 times higher at 7,873 than it was on November 1, 2020, and some hospitals are preparing to declare a crisis in standards of care, and patients will be triaged to determine which patients are priorities for limited resources, such as ICU beds and ventilators.

He noted that there are 3 tiers in Phase 1a: frontline workers, nursing facilities, and skilled nursing facilities. Despite what people are hearing in the media, the county is making progress and moving forward with vaccine distribution. Even in the most difficult and challenging time, so far over 130,000 doses have been administered of one of two COVID-19 vaccines approved for Emergency Use Authorization. Frontline healthcare workers are beginning to get their second dose of vaccine. At this time, we are progressing through the various tiers of Phase 1a (healthcare workers and the residents and staff of long term care and Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs), and anticipate moving into Phase 1b by early February, which includes people 75 and older and frontline essential workers in its first tier. People 65 and older and a broader list of essential workers are prioritized in the second tier of Phase 1b before moving on to Phase 1c, anticipated in late March or early April, which will include people 16 -64 with chronic health conditions and co-morbidities placing them at risk.

Russel Mahler, *RCAC 1 Chair*, asked Dr. Seidman if L.A. Care is doing anything to help the homeless with the vaccine. Dr. Seidman responded that L.A. Care is not involved at the administration level. L.A. Care is at the informational level. He noted that the population is at increased risk. He cannot say for sure what phase they fall in. Some members are at increased risk if they are sheltered or temporary sheltered. DPH is guiding the distribution of the vaccine.

	<p>Member Vazquez asked Dr. Seidman how L.A. Care members will receive notification when they are eligible to get the vaccine. Dr. Seidman responded that the vaccine is at no cost to members. The Federal government has purchased several million doses of the vaccine. Members will not be billed. It is not yet time to receive the vaccine for most members and they will not receive any notification yet. Many Federally Qualified Health Center clinics have already received vaccine for their frontline workers. Providing vaccine to private doctors that number in the thousands in Los Angeles County, will be a challenge.</p> <p>Deaka McClain, <i>At-Large Member</i>, stated that the vaccine is not necessarily going to stop people from getting COVID-19. She noted that some people believe that they will not be infected once they get the vaccine. Dr. Seidman responded that the vaccine is highly effective. The clinical trials included 70,000 people in work groups. There was a 95% reduction in risk of getting COVID-19, which makes it a highly effective vaccine. Even after you get both doses of the vaccine people should continue to follow public health safety guidelines. It takes a couple of weeks to develop a 50% resistance to the virus. After the second dose, it goes up to 95% protection. It is not a 100% reduction in infection and it does not mean that people can't get infected. That is why people should continue to wear masks, wash hands, and socially distance. The second dose can cause mild side effects such as cough, a light cold, and body aches. This has not discouraged people from getting the second dose.</p> <p>Ms. McFerson noted that the colored community is affected most by the COVID-19 virus due underlying conditions. She is most affected. If you have a heart condition you will be most affected. She would like to know where do disabled people stand on prioritization of the vaccination. Dr. Seidman responded that she is right about the age cohorts. Anyone age 75 and above regardless of comorbidities, disabilities, or chronic conditions can get the first dose of the vaccine. Once L.A. Care gets the green light to begin immunizing members it will begin to communicate this information to members to high risk members. That's when L.A. Care will begin conducting outreach to members.</p> <p>Ms. Byrd stated that she does not wish to be grim, but she does speak for everyone with the virus, African Americans and Hispanics are being put forth in the media as the only populations who have gotten the virus. It has created a falseness in the Caucasian community. In Orange County, the rate is high among Caucasians. She would like to know how many Caucasian people are being infected and dying due to the virus. She pointed out that the President does not wear masks and chooses not to wear them. Dr. Seidman responded that he has seen this on television. He asked everyone to please do the right thing. Wearing masks helps protect other people and the person wearing the mask as well.</p>

Ms. Johnson responded at the moment health promoters will not be participating in any face to face activities due to public health safety guidelines.</p> <p>Ms. Lara asked Ms. Johnson if they will be doing presentations in Spanish as well to make it even more accessible. Ms. Johnson responded that presentations are held in both English and Spanish.</p> <p>Ms. Perez thanked Ms. Johnson for her presentation and the opportunity for being able to help their communities. She noted that it is a great necessity for the health promoters to help L.A. Care reach out to people in their community.</p>

Global Issues Update

In response to a request for a COVID-19 kit for members which could be picked up at the Community Resource Centers (CRC) or mailed to disabled members who could not pick it up, she reported that L.A. Care leadership is reviewing the feasibility of this request and will report at the next ECAC meeting.

RCAC COVID Conference

L.A. Care’s CO&E will host the first ever RCAC virtual Conference on COVID titled, “Where do we go from here?” The esteemed panel will be moderated by Dr. Seidman and Dr. James Kyle, as well as guest panelist Dr. Erika Uribe, Los Angeles County Department of Health, and Dr. Oliver Brooks, Watts Health Care Foundation. The purpose of the forum is to bring RCAC members together to learn about the current status of COVID-19 in Los-Angeles County, encourage COVID testing and to educate members on the newly approved vaccines and their benefits. The event be held on January 27, 2021 from 10:00 am to 11:30 am, via Zoom. CO&E’s Field Specialists will be reaching out to RCAC members with more information.

L.A. Care’s Black History Month Planning Committee

In honor of Black History Month, CO&E staff is working with Dr. Kyle to plan a two-part series addressing health disparities in the African American Community titled, “A Vision and Voice for Equity”. This two-part series will consist of panel conversations with key community organizations that are making strides to improve the health of African Americans, particularly in Maternal Child Health and Mental Health.

We ask for support of all advisory members to assist with the promotion of the events which will also take place on the Zoom platform on February 4 (Maternal Child Health) from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. and February 26 (Mental Health) from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. All sessions will be in both English and Spanish. L.A. Care will have an active social media campaign and a robust internal campaign to promote Black History month.

L.A. Care has agreed to sponsored the California Pan Ethnic Health Network’s Voices for Change Conference, “Revolutionizing Health Equity,” February 9 to February 11.

CRC Update

In response to the recent surge in COVID-19 cases, all CRCs are closed. The closure may be extended, depending on the spread of the virus over the next month.

Holiday Appreciation Event

The CRCs held seven holiday appreciation events in December where grocery gift cards were distributed to attendees. L.A. Care will continue the gift card distribution events once CRCs reopen.

	<p>Ms. Perez stated that many people who have struggled with not having a job, and she thanked Dr. Eakins for advocating for members to continue to receive for the stipend. She thanked her for providing the food gift card. She hopes that staff can call members and check on them, because sometimes a text can be cold.</p> <p>Ms. McFerson noted that Dr. Eakins mentioned a motion update and that L.A. Care is working through different ideas of how the motion will be implemented. She asked who will be providing information on the motion. Ms. Eakins responded that the motion was provided to leadership. She learned that there are two different departments who are conducting tasks similar to what was outlined in the motion. L.A. Care is looking as a whole at how they can combine those efforts with ECAC for these tasks. Ms. McFerson asked if they will be providing a food security bonus for the rest of the year. Ms. Eakins responded that L.A. Care gave this bonus card in response to addressing food security during the 2020 holiday period. Members will continue to receive their stipend but the bonus card was a one- time occurrence. Due to COVID-19 the cards can't be mailed, and the amount was added to their stipend payment.</p>
